During the service, The Reverend Mary Copping blessed a memorial stone, whose legend describes Peter as a 'Joyful Pilgrim'. I pray that we might all know both joy and hope of Easter, wherever we journey.

Liz awarded MBE

THE former Vice-Chanceller of the University of Winchester has been appointed MBE in the King's New Year Honours.

Reverend Professor Elizabeth Stuart received the award for her services to higher education.

The award of MBE, Member of the Order of the British Empire, is awarded for an outstanding achievement or service to the community which has had a long-term, significant impact.

Revd Stuart served in various roles at the University for over 25 years, including leading the university as Vice-Chancellor in 2021.

She said: "I am humbled and honoured to be recognised in this way. It has been a joy and privilege to serve the University of Winchester for over 25 years, seeing students over that time go on to make a real difference in the world.

"Universities play such an important role in building a stronger society and enriching the local community, and I have loved playing a small part in that over the course of my career".

As well as serving as Vice-Chancellor, and deputy Vice-Chancellor and Provost, Revd Stuart was involved in various national initiatives relating to internationalisation



and higher education, equality and diversity, the Research Excellence Framework, and degree classification.

Professor Sarah Greer, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Winchester, said: "We are all delighted to see Liz honoured in this way.

"She has been a huge part of the success of the University of Winchester and has served the wider community here in Winchester with compassion and purpose for over 25 years. We are so grateful for what she has built here for generations past, present and future."

Revd Stuart, who retired from the University in July 2023, is now a nonexecutive member of the Chapter of Winchester Cathedral, associate priest at the Parish of St Matthew and St Paul, Winchester, and is also a bank chaplain for Hampshire Hospitals Foundation Trust.

Tarrying with the Lord in Lent



What happens when groups who have traditionally not had a voice in theological reflection claim that voice? A wonderful kaleidoscope of voices creates a new Pentecost experience, which teaches us that all theological reflection is contextual and reflects who we are.

This year's Archbishop of Canterbury Lent Book, *Tarry Awhile: Wisdom from Black Spirituality for People of Faith* by Selina Stone, introduces us to some of the insights of black theology and spirituality.

Three groups of people in the parish have been studying this book throughout Lent. It is not always a comfortable experience. Those of us who are white have been confronted with our privilege and the way that our culture and faith has constructed darkness and blackness in negative terms. We have been introduced to different ways of thinking, worshipping and engaging with God. We have been confronted



with texts of terror for black people and examples of prejudice within our scriptures.

The central theme of the book is the need to 'tarry', to wait on God, and the various ways in which black spirituality encourages us to do that.

Often our problem is that we think that we can control God, directing him only to bits of us we want him to see. But when we tarry and allow God to come to us in an undefended state he gazes into every aspect of our lives. This is a book about struggle, fortitude, faith, resurrection and hopeful waiting upon God to make all things new. It has been the perfect book to study for Lent.

Annual revision of electoral roll 2024

Each year, we as a parish are required to revise or renew the electoral roll. We carried out the renewal in 2019 so, this year, it is just a revision of the electoral roll that is necessary. The electoral roll is officially a list of people who are entitled to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and to take part in its proceedings. Unofficially, it is a list of people who consider themselves to be members of our church family.

Those who are already on the electoral roll need do nothing. If you are not on the electoral roll and are new to the church or the parish, you can obtain a form online or in person. You can download and print it (scan the first QR code), e-mail me for a copy (address above), complete the form online (second QR code) or pick up a form from either St Paul's or St Matthew's. Once your form has been completed, please email it to me directly or take it to the parish office.

The revision has to be completed by 29 April, after which the electoral roll (names only) will be on display at both St Matthew's and St Paul's. They will be available for inspection at the parish office for the two weeks before the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Services at other churches

This also feels a very good way of sharing the abundant resources we have at St Matthew and St Paul. We have four active clergy and we have very involved and lively congregations. We are hugely blessed and this is a great way of sharing our blessings with other churches.



Now that Liz is a Canon at the Cathedral she is called on to lead services, preach, attend lots of meetings and be very involved in the life of the Cathedral. This is another way that we are sharing our resources.

A third way is in our contribution to the Diocesan Common Mission Fund. This fund not only contributes towards some of our own clergy but also enables us to support those churches which are not so fortunate.

So, when I'm not at our churches on Sunday mornings, I may be at one of many churches around the Diocese.

A fond farewell to the much-loved Peter Seal

On 12 February, a thanksgiving Eucharist was held at St Paul's for the life of Peter Seal. Peter served as Rector of the Parish of St Matthew with St Paul for over 20 years. He was a muchloved and respected figure in the city and diocese, and passed away last year after a short illness.

The Revd Dr Jonathan Rowe, present Rector of St Matthew with St Paul, greeted everyone. He told us that Peter had a phrase for the churches in his parish: 'Pilgrims on a journey'. This phrase would become the theme of the thanksgiving service.



There were about 20 robed clergy including the Bishop of Basingstoke and Dean Catherine Ogle, and representatives of local clergy.

Tributes were paid by Peter's son, Dr Philip Seal, and by Professor Bill Lucas, Churchwarden of St Paul's. The sermon was given by The Very Revd Catherine Ogle.

The service included the Reaffirmation of





Baptismal Vows, with Bishop David throwing water from the font over the congregation, and Holy Communion for around 250 people.

During the service a memorial stone to Peter was blessed by the Revd Mary Copping, Asst Priest in the Parish. The words of the memorial were read out: 'Canon Peter Seal Rector 2001-2021 Joyful Pilgrim'

The prayers of intercession were given by Katie Seal, Peter's daughter, with another member of the parish.

The music was glorious. The talented Churchwarden Bill Lucas sang The Peruvian Gloria; musicians from the Parish (pianist, violinist and flautists) played beautifully, also accompanying one of the hymns. The wonderful choir included our former organist Tom Jesty. It was such a joy to listen to.

I knew Peter Seale as a student, and after the service met up with the two boys he shared a house with. It was lovely to reminisce after so many years. One of them had looked forward to meeting up more frequently with Peter after they had both retired, but Peter tragically died after only having enjoyed retirement for 17 months.

It was a wonderful, uplifting service, and a great tribute to honour Peter's ministry and service.

Epic youth away day

In March the 11-14s group had an away day, heading off to the sunny climes of St Mary's Chapel in King's Worthy! In the morning we enjoyed workshops led by the Wildfire Youth Project team, investigating the question that Jesus posed 'Who do you say I am?' (Matthew 16:15) in three parts:

- When Jesus walked upon water, his disciples thought he was a ghost. But one of them trusted him and stepped out onto the water, too. After watching this scene from the acclaimed series *The Chosen*, we made tin foil boats to float across water and discussed whether and how we can trust Jesus.
- On the cross, with thieves either side of him, Jesus faced false accusations, but one thief asked Jesus to remember him despite the things he'd done wrong. The children were invited to write on paper and nailed to a wooden cross any wrong things they may have done.





 After the resurrection, how did Jesus' disciples recognise him? Mary Magdalene recognised him when he spoke her name; others when he walked with them on the road to Emmaus; others when he broke bread with them. We made bread together while listening to the gospel reading and then went on a walk to discuss how we can recognise Jesus in our own lives.

In the afternoon we let off steam at the Winchester Golf Academy using their Toptracer technology in the driving range to see how far and high we could to get our golf balls. It was a really fun day – many thanks to Ellie and Nina from Wildfire and to Vicki, Katie and the various parents who acted as chauffeurs and made the day possible.





Eco Church Award for St Paul's

Have you spotted our Silver Eco Church award yet for St Paul's? It's near the chapel and recognises work done over some years to improve our 'green' stewardship and environmental impact. It applies to the ministry, our buildings, land use and activities.

We registered St Paul's site some years ago with the Anglican Church's Eco Church programme. This is a graded awards scheme and helps churches improve their environmental record, teaching, ministry and stewardship of God's creation. St Matthew's have also been tending their site and gardens to support more wildlife and diversity.

The scheme is run by the international Christian charity A Rocha (Portuguese for 'The Rock'). It helps church communities worldwide protect and restore God's natural world. Eco Church is just one of its programmes, and has 3 award levels; Bronze (awarded to St Paul's in 2021), Silver (2024) and Gold (our next ambition).

Eco Church awards assess our environmental 'ethos' and practices as stewards of God's creation. This is the commitment to be responsible Christian stewards of creation in ministry and daily life.

Eco Church awards assess across four broad categories

Worship and Teaching

Emphasis on caring for God's Creation in preaching, prayer and services including regular 'green' communions, children's work, broader education eg home groups and courses.

Management of Buildings and Land

Energy efficiency and carbon footprint, cleaning/catering materials, recycling/waste policies (especially community and other events), rewilding, wildlife and planting plans for the site.

Community and Global Engagement

Supporting environmental projects e.g. giving through 'Beyond Ourselves', learning from charities and projects we support, engaging more with planning, development and environmental issues.

Daily Life

Buying renewable energy, recycling, reducing waste and harmful travel (eg flying), buying more local 'Fairtrade' and organic food and goods, investing church and personal funds ethically.

We are all Pilgrims on an environmental journey, one of many others in our faith. So the next steps will be towards becoming a Gold Eco Church, needing more of us to become more involved as the practical nature of each step becomes clearer.

Reaching this level does not automatically mean being 'net zero', when all harmful climate emissions from our activities are reduced or offset to zero. This is still the Anglican Church's, and the world's, eventual target to achieve it. It takes many steps, but we've already achieved many.

Even before St Paul's and St Matthew's refurbishments, our policy was to use recyclable materials,

Fairtrade supplies and cleaning chemicals and compostable or recyclable items for Community Days and lunches (not disposables).

Both church sites only use renewable electricity but still rely on gas for heating and hot water. Although the boilers are maximum efficiency, aiming for Gold will need a plan to measure and gradually reduce our carbon footprint.

And there will slowly be more projects which will need help, so watch for notices or requests over coming months. We hope to outline the practical tasks and changes we need to encourage together in our stewardship of the environment, both at home and on our church sites.

Things that can help:

- if you can, buy more local/seasonal, Fairtrade and organic food, and less meat and packaged/processed foods
- switch to renewable electricity at home, reduce gas use if you can, water consumption, air travel and car journeys when possible
- gardening and planting at home and on our sites to encourage more wildlife, e.g. adding to 'bug hotel' and nesting features
- commenting or engaging more with organisations or representatives about planning and development issues and environmental concerns



Winchester Cathedral silent disco

On 17 February, several of us attended Winchester Cathedral's 'Silent disco under the moon. This took advantage of the amazing art installation 'Festival of the Moon' that was displayed in the Cathedral through most of January.

Despite some initial apprehensions, we found there was a real mix of ages (not just the youngsters!) And the headphones had a great selection of quality music, from Abba to Tom Jones. We danced the night away (until 9.30pm at least, when it finished) and can't wait for the next one!

A word from Steve Brine MP

Spring is in the air and it's a delight to contribute, as I have for some 14 years, to this special edition of the parish magazine.

As our Member of Parliament, I regularly visit local schools, which remains the most rewarding, and often hilarious, part of the job. Indeed I was once asked, at a local primary school, the best question so far – 'Mr Brine, are your suits itchy?' Not to-date was my answer but there is, I suppose, still time.

Anyway, as I go around I find dedicated teaching (and support) staff who love what they do but there's not enough of them and, in particular, they tell me they just cannot recruit the teaching assistants they need to support an increasingly complex picture. The number of 'lockdown' children coming to the school system with special educational needs – and the growing number with formal education, healthcare plans – is a huge challenge for all state schools.

I am therefore really pleased to see a new teaching apprenticeship that will launch this autumn, revolutionising the way schools recruit teachers.

The 'teacher degree apprenticeship' will offer a high-quality, alternative route for people to become qualified teachers. This includes people who may not be able to take time out to study full-time for a degree, such as teaching assistants or staff already working in schools.

Trainees on the new teacher degree apprenticeship will spend around 40% of their time studying, gain qualified teacher status and all tuition fees are paid for, so trainees won't be saddled with debt. I think it will be a game-changing opportunity for schools to nurture and retain talent from the ground up. Be interested, as always, to hear what you think.



Secondly, because we Brits can sometimes be our own worst enemy, there's some really good news on the subject I have written about before in this magazine – NHS dentistry.

Back in February, the long-awaited Dental Recovery Plan appeared. Its focus on prevention has to be right, and the roll out of the 'Smile for Life' programme to reduce dental decay in children will see parents-to-be offered advice on baby gums and milk teeth. Babies and toddlers in nurseries will also have tooth brushing as part of the daily routine.

Measures for short-term recovery are also welcome. This includes some 2.5 million additional NHS appointments, as well as additional money for NHS dentists to treat adults and children who have not seen a dentist in over two years. Also incentives for dentists to work in underserved areas, with one-off 'golden hello' payments of up to £20,000. The idea of dental vans to help deliver care in rural and coastal areas is interesting and I will be seeing if we can get a slice of that in parts of my constituency.

The British Dental Association described the Health Select Committee (which I chair) report on NHS dentistry as 'an instruction manual' to save it, but achieving that will require all of this – and more. We have the Minister before my committee very soon so watch this space.

As I know many of you will have seen, I was at the centre of another very high-profile national story recently as I published a longawaited report on assisted suicide / assisted dying. It follows a 14-month inquiry the select committee undertook, which remains one of the largest in parliamentary history. We aimed to produce, and I hope we have done so, a comprehensive report to inform MPs as/when/if we are asked to formally consider any proposals to change the law. It's amazing that one in three people in the world still don't have a toilet they can use.

Toilet Twinning funds hygiene education via community-led workshops and sourcing local materials for families and communities to build their own toilets.

As one of our supported charities, SWVG was the focus of many activities in the Parish last June and December.

We recently received a message from the group thanking us for the generous donations they received from our fundraising efforts last year and our continuing support this year. They were also delighted with the toiletries collection organised by our young people in December. These items are really appreciated by people seeking asylum and refugees. As our contact with the group said – "Your support means a lot to us and especially to those with whom we work." The group also welcomes donations of bikes, phones, suitcases and other useful items.

Late last year we went to the Avenue Multicultural Centre in Southampton to see what our donations are helping to support. We met several of the group's volunteers and learned about various aspects of their work including help with legal, financial and housing issues, their "befriending" scheme and one to one English language tuition. The Centre provides a lively social environment where people can chat, play games, make music and enjoy light meals and refreshments. We were really impressed by the warm supportive atmosphere and not surprised to learn that many people seeking asylum end up volunteering with the charity once they receive refugee status.

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
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
